As an artist and poet from Trinidad and Tobago, a country rich with mystery, folklore, myths and legends, it came as a very pleasant surprise to me to discover that here in the Fens there is a similar numen in the cultural atmosphere. Almost immediately I experienced a deep affinity. It is something felt. It appealed to my artistic and poetic sensibilities. I experience the Fens (still so much of it for me to explore) filtered through the creative imagination: there is a sense of invisible entities; ghosts still living their past histories transposed into tales of folklore. It is all redolent in the very air we breathe.

And how fabulous the broad skies of the Fens, their wonderful cloud formations forever changing. It is impossible to catch their precise moment of change. How generously they lend themselves to the poetic imagination, morphing continuously into fabulous forms, and like a lofty muse, inspiring paintings, inspiring poems.

#### **Fen Poets Walk**

Wide skies of eel clouds
Over layered Fenland histories.
We walk avoiding a deception:
The Euclidean point that vanishes into infinity
At the end of parallel ploughed furrows.
Broad horizons may tempt us into metaphor,
But our ambitions are of a modest kind:
Finding a word order that takes us further
Than our walking feet can.

## CONNECTIONS CANCER CLUB

## How the club that has helped so many cope with cancer began...

One time Manager of Littleport Town FC, who started the youth team, the Colts, back in 1991 with John Cray, football and Spurs enthusiast, Bev Scott, and his wife Sue, are the founders and organisers of Littleport's 'Connections Cancer Club'.

They have both been visited by that very unwelcome illness, and it was Bev's experience in 2000 and Sue's in 2007 that determined them to start a club that offered friendship, understanding and support, for other people in the village who've been affected by cancer in any way.

Bev was diagnosed with bowel cancer fourteen years ago, and from there

on his life changed. There were those hospital visits consultations, scans, investigative procedures, pre-op radiation and the big operation followed by chemotherapy. Then the readjustments he had to make in his everyday living. himself He counts fortunate because in all this upheaval Bev was supported by the one he calls his soul mate, Sue, as well as his family and friends.

He is happy to relate that



he was also helped through those difficult times by his faith and prayer.

The club has been meeting since it began in the St John's Methodist Chapel in High Street, and will meet there again in December on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> but then moves to a new permanent venue in January. You'll then find this friendly group between the hours of 10 am and 2 pm in the Day Centre situated in the Village Hall on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday of every month.

Bev and Sue also have some special fundraising plans for 2015 as the group relies on donations.

The first thing Bev did after completing his post-op chemo was to arrange a sponsored 6 mile walk around Littleport that raised £3,000 for the Oncology Department at Addenbrooke's where he'd been treated.

As for what keeps this great couple's commitment to 'Connections' going, Sue says, "We just want to show people that there is a light at the end of the tunnel," and Bev is on record as saying in 2007,"I do hope that I can help others through the hard times cancer can cause."

It looks like both of them have succeeded.

The results were fed back to the Committee, including Littleport Parish Council and an Action Plan was drawn up to address the issues.

However, anyone is invited to join the team as long as they represent a shop or business in Littleport and have a strong interest in helping us make the most of Littleport. We are not trying to duplicate any group that already exists and our focus is only on the high street (in generic terms) with the aim to increase footfall and awareness of town centre facilities and services.

#### What do we hope to achieve?

Our Action Plan for the first year running from 1st October 2014 is to:

- · Look into the feasibility of introducing a regular market
- Devise a Town Centre events and promotions programme including a Christmas Town Centre Celebration on Saturday 5th December (more details to follow)
- Develop a marketing campaign, in particular through Facebook and other social media
- · Devise a Residents Pack with information on what Littleport's High Street has to offer



# YOUR MP UPDATE FROM STEPHEN BARCLAY

It is excellent news that Eric Pickles, Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, has decided not to call in the application for Ely's Southern bypass but will instead respect the decision of Cambridgeshire County Council.



This follows representations to Mr Pickles by my neighbouring MP Sir Jim Paice and myself to respect localism given the strong support for the bypass from the local community. Sir Jim and I also met with English Heritage earlier in the year to discuss their concerns about the proposals.

The bypass is crucial to the area's transport infrastructure and economic growth, and is needed to alleviate the delays suffered by constituents living in and around Ely, including those in Littleport, Sutton, Mepal, Witcham and Little Downham.

The scheme has huge support locally from the majority of residents, Ely town council, the county council, and both local MPs, and there is a very strong economic case for the bypass to go-ahead. I am pleased the Secretary of State has taken this into account.

If the application was called-in then there was the potential for a lengthy delay, with work not being able to start until late 2016 at the earliest. This decision means that timetable can be brought forward and I will be speaking to Cambridgeshire County Council to ensure work starts as soon as possible.

Congratulations to JDR Cables in Littleport on winning a major contract to supply 95km of underwater cable to the Statoil/Statkraft Dudgeon offshore wind farm. The design and manufacture of the cable will take place at JDR's UK bases in Littleport and Hartlepool. This is great news for local jobs and for the firm itself, which is leading the way for high tech manufacturing businesses in Cambridgeshire by showing that quality, locally manufactured products really can tap into growth markets overseas as far away as Australia and contribute to the long-term health of the economy.

I am continuing with my "Treat me local" health campaign and will be hosting a health summit next month to drive home the need for better treatment provision closer to home.

Over a 1,000 people have signed up in support of the campaign through my petition and I am planning to bring it before parliament shortly.

It is well documented that this area is like the "Cinderella" of the county when it comes to service provision of all kinds. Health and being able to access good services locally is vital and I hope we can redress some of the historical imbalances in provision through this campaign.


## **POPPY APPEAL 2013**

## Preserving our Past for the Future

The Littleport Society, founded in 1987, is the foremost and premier organisation in Littleport dedicated to the history and heritage of Littleport. It is not just for local people, as we have members from neighbouring villages, and from all parts of the U.K., Australia, Canada, and the U.S.A. Many of our members have one thing in common, their ancestors were baptised, married and buried in the churches and chapels of Littleport; they tilled the fenland soil; they fished in the rivers, they brewed and drank the beer; they made the shirts, and they lived through wars, riots, depressions and epidemics, many being forced to emigrate to improve their lot.

The Society has for 27 years worked to research and record, collect and preserve the rich tapestry of Littleport's history and heritage. Over the years many of our members have helped to amass a vast database of genealogical records, which is available to all who wish to trace their roots. Research into the history and development of Littleport is also an ongoing process, this often uncovers surprising facts that have lain unknown for centuries.

Over the years the Society has collected by donation and purchase a large collection of archive material, consisting of photographs, drawings, paintings, maps, and all kinds of historical documents and ephemera relating to the parish. All are stored in acid free envelopes and boxes to ensure their preservation. The collection is at present undergoing a complete re-organisation, cataloguing, and indexing. We also have a collection of artefacts and textiles relating to Littleport. The largest item being a Wheeler & Wilson sewing machine that is the only survivor of those installed in the shirt factory in 1882.

Our archaeological collection, consisting of Roman and Medieval and Bronze Age fragments, as well as fossils, is at present undergoing identification, dating and recording by professional archaeologists and palaeontologists.

The collections are housed at the Barn, which we share with the Parish Council, and are open to view at any time by appointment, or can be seen at our open days during the year. Help is always available for anyone undertaking research projects, or school or university courses, as well as authors and historians. The Society is also affiliated to The Cambridgeshire Association for Local History, and The Cambridge Antiquarian Society.

Our members through their subscriptions help the Society with the work of recording, collecting and preserving our heritage. Members receive a 12 page quarterly magazine, which is packed with articles and features about Littleport and

the surrounding area. The Society also holds open meetings on the first Tuesday of each month at the Village Hall at 7.30 pm, when guest speakers give an informative illustrated talk on a wide variety of local subjects. We also publish books from time to time on Littleport, and give guided walks around the town to individuals and groups upon request. We also have a website <a href="www.littleportsociety.org.uk">www.littleportsociety.org.uk</a> which is frequently updated and developed.

If you would like to play a part in safeguarding our heritage all you need do is join the Society. Annual subscriptions range from £2 to £5, yes "that's" all, although an extra donation is always welcome.

If you are interested in local history and heritage, you might consider joining the Committee, there is always something interesting to do. The Committee meets every third Tuesday of the month at the Barn at 7.30 pm. Why not drop in and see us, or give us a ring, Maureen on 860236, Bruce on 860889, or Roger 01954 781 220. ## SOME FANCY FOOTWORK IN LITTLEPORT

"When people come in to see me for the first time they often ask 'Is it going to hurt', I usually put them at ease with a joke. Well I'm not going to feel a thing — so I don't know" Angela Wilson, Littleport's very own caring chiropodist, told *Littleport Life Magazine's reporter Cathy Gibb*.

Having nursed her mother through the illness from which she died at only 45 just after Angela had just left school, nursing seemed the obvious career option. She began her career caring for the elderly, went on to nursing disabled children at Ida Darwin, and then back to caring for the elderly at a home in Chesterton, Cambridgeshire. However, Angela knew she was destined to become a chiropodist!

"I was a very impressionable 16 year old. I remember seeing this massive house with a beautiful garden and on this door hung a huge brass plaque, but I couldn't read what it said. I saw people constantly coming in and out of that house, and I found out they were chiropodists who dealt with feet. I thought that's the kind of job I would like to do and the kind of house I'd like to live in."

So at 33 years of age Angela decided she wanted to move into a new working career and into a profession which she says "still brings satisfaction and fulfilment" and as Angela puts it: "I literally help people walk properly and go away with a

spring in their step".

Angela told me that she began to read up everything and anything she could get hold of on the subject. She studied hard, took all the exams necessary and after three years she received all the certificates and qualifications to become a registered chiropodist/podiatrist and massage therapist.

Angela continued; "Now we all suffer from some kind of pain somewhere in our bodies which of course includes our feet. People need to be aware of how important foot care is otherwise you can experience all kinds of problems from corns to verucas, infected feet to callouses, hard skin, heel pain, in-growing toenails, flat feet



and the effects of diabetes. One of our specialist areas in chiropody is diabetes which can affect the nerve endings in the feet, and it is important to ensure that diabetic people look after their feet.

"I also check lower limbs from the knees down plus the foot pulses which usually tells me a lot about someone's health. When dealing with older people you have to



take into consideration that their body system could be sluggish and often waste products accumulate in their feet because they are unable to be dispersed or they could be taking medication or have heart and blood problems."

Angela lived a full and very busy life working and living in Cambridge, but she says that it

became too time consuming.

She then decided to move out to the countryside and Littleport seemed the ideal location.

Angela loves the more pleasurable and laid back Littleport lifestyle, living and working in a magnificent house surrounded by a well cared for garden and an impressive brass plaque is found on the front wall adjacent to the front gate. It reads: Chiropodist & Podiatrist Mrs Angela Wilson MSSCh. MBChA. Qualified Surgical Chiropodist. Registered Member of the British Chiropody & Podiatry Assocation.

Angela Wilson certainly her dream of helping people in this special and highly skilled way and in those special homely surroundings, and the brass plaque, come true, through sheer hard work, perseverance determination and achieve her original ambition!



## A MESSAGE FROM: ST GEORGE'S CHURCH



Christmas is here again; perhaps you find Christmas difficult and have to brace yourself against the hearty good wishes and the singing Santas, but Christmas is not intended to be difficult. The idea behind Christmas is that everything we know points to something beyond ourselves, to God; a God who wants us to know Him and who makes himself known. And our Christmas traditions have built on that idea.

One of the biggest Christmas traditions is the Christmas tree. Back in the eighth century, St Boniface is credited with dedicating the first pine tree as special for Christmas, a Christmas tree. St Boniface spoke of how the evergreen tree shows the everlasting love God has for the world. But the evergreen idea started way back when the early Christians "piggy-backed" Christmas onto the Pagan festival of Saturnalia; the Christians said "you understand earth's cycles and are looking for light and growth to return - well Jesus is the guy who's behind it all. And to make it plainer still, he was born like us to grow up and tell us about God".

The idea behind using the pine tree helps us in other ways too. Pines are tall trees. Certainly they start off little like any other, but left to their own devices, they grow straight and tall, pointing to the sky. The Christmas story was announced in the skies; announced by the angels and by the star. The pine tree points like an arrow to the heavens, almost as if it says, "look! listen! the glory and the splendour of the heavens proclaim the glory and the majesty of God".

And the Christmas tree is rooted in the earth. For some people it is blasphemous to suggest that God can come here at all; for others, when he rocked up why did he not sort out everything properly? For the Christian, the idea that God came to us is wonderful and amazing; that way, He knows what it's like to be us and we can reach him. This idea has not gone away and pops up repeatedly, often in the most unlikely places – (a bit like the being born round the back).

So our Christmas tree idea is more than just evergreen. It points us to the skies and the grandeur of God and it is rooted firmly in the earth, emphasising Christ the Son of God coming here. The idea behind the tree helps us appreciate that the Christmas story really does bridge heaven and earth. And when it's all over, the turkey eaten, the presents put away (or taken back) and January is upon us, the evergreen tree keeps in mind the idea of a God who doesn't leave us, who will be with us throughout 2015.

# LITTLEPORT SPIRITUALIST CHURCH

## From the New Spiritualists' Society Principle Minister

Those of us who come together one evening a week at the Village Hall are indeed a 'church'. We are a group of people who themselves are seekers after the spiritual side of life, and who welcome any others who possess that same impulse.

We try to emulate those members of the early church who gathered together on a week-day to pray together. There is little to no description of the buildings in which those churches were convened. They were caves or the dwelling places of the followers of Jesus and The Way. Christians weren't called Christians for some time after Jesus was crucified, and this rarely and as a form of denigration. Mostly they were referred to as talmidim, students (of a rabbi) or kadosh, holy or 'saints'. Their churches were people meeting in spiritual fellowship where spiritual teachings and healings by the power of prayer were experienced. We are also a healing church.

We also know that they did not meet on the Sabbath, the day given to celebrate the Creation, deemed a day of rest, but on the first day of the week, yom rishon, marking the resurrection of Christ/the messiach, a working day. We meet up on Thursdays to practice our religious beliefs. These depart from orthodox Christian services however as although founded on the absolute conviction that there is life after death, we believe that it can be proved through mediumistic communication with the heavenly realms.

In these months of less daylight, it's good to enjoy a festival of light as Jesus, Yeshuah, and those early followers of The Way would have done. During these Winter months we also celebrate the nativity of the man who is called the Light of the World. And we look forward to that supernal light shining forth into the new year ahead.

The fashion show kindly put on by M&Co of Ely was held on 7th October and was well supported. The models were members of Littleport WI with some family




members supporting us. For this we thank Geoff, Jessica and Abigail. Well done and a big thank you.

Then another job came my way but the travelling really got me down, so when I heard my Nan say that, I thought 'I fancy looking into this oven cleaning business', and it's been one of the best decisions I have ever made in my life.

# Working For You

Local councils work to improve community well-being and provide better services at a local level. Their activities fall into three main categories: representing the local community; delivering services to meet local needs; improving quality of life and community well being.

Local councils can provide and maintain a variety of important and visible local services including allotments, bridleways, burial grounds, bus shelters, car parks, commons and open spaces, community transport schemes, community safety and crime reduction measures, events and festivals, footpaths, leisure and sports facilities, litter bins, public toilets, planning, street cleaning and lighting, tourism activities, traffic calming measures, village greens and youth projects. These existing powers were recently strengthened by powers contained in the Localism Act including the extension of the General power of competence to eligible local councils

Here is just a brief look at some of the work addressed on your behalf in the once monthly meetings of your Council and the Councillors and Clerk and Deputy Clerk of the Littleport Parish Council. Full Minutes are available at the Council's offices at The Barn. From August to October 2014.

PUBLIC QUESTION TIME & COMMUNITY ISSUES REPORT:

Members received the current Community Issues Report before public question time. Ms de Swarte spoke on the subject of her proposal to build a 400m speed skating oval in Littleport.

Mr J Coleby spoke on behalf of residents regarding the flooding of the culvert in the Hythe/Ponts Hill area. Councillor D I Ambrose Smith will contact the Internal Drainage Board.

#### COUNTRYWIDE SURFACE WATER MANAGEMENT PLAN:

Copies of the survey were handed to the public who were asked to complete them and return to the Clerk by the end of the week for submission to the County Council.

Councillor F J W Brown raised concerns the run off from the Highfield Estate was a major factor in gardens and ditches abutting the site were now suffering from flooding.

It was noted that surface water drainage is now the responsibility of the County Council. To date there are 16 blocked drains in Littleport.

Standing Orders were suspended to allow members of the public to comment.

They reported flooding is not only confined to the low lying areas of the parish; Millfield has seen gardens flooded.

# Standing Orders then resumed.

FINANCE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS:

Councillor Boyd reported on the recommendations of the Finance Committee.

# The Clerk reported:

Balfour Beatty quote for street lighting at Longfield Road will be on the September agenda

License relating to St George's Medical Centre has been completed.

**DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORTS:** 

Councillor D I Ambrose Smith reported there was a shortfall of 320 new houses

across the District and the District Council was actively looking for new sites.

#### **ALLOTMENTS & OPEN SPACES MEETING:**

Members received the report of the meeting.

Councillor C M Ambrose Smith suggested members should view the Country Park in Ely in relation to the utilising the Paddocks as public open space.

Councillor J J B Lee warned against possible motor cycles use of the proposed dirt cycle track

#### **ADAMS HERITAGE CENTRE:**

Standing Orders were suspended to allow Alan Summerside a trustee of the Heritage Centre and Chairman of the Littleport Society and Debra Jordan another Trustee to speak .

Mr Summerside is currently working on a new constitution for the society to consider. Currently the constitution does not allow for the artefacts to leave the Barn and can only be viewed by appointment.

Ms Jordan outlined the plans for the Heritage Centre and funding.

Agreed the Parish Council should stand back and wait for an overview from Mr Summerside.

#### **LOCAL BUS SERVICES – CHANGES:**

Members agreed for the 129 Weekly Service from Black Horse Drove to Ely. This gives a  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hour stop in Ely rather than 2 hours.

#### PLAY AREAS:

Members received the report on the Parish Council owned play areas.

Sanctuary Hereward have already funded two local groups in Littleport and may not have further funding available. Graham Nolan from Sanctuary Hereward is attending our November meeting.

#### PROPOSED SPEED SKATING OVAL:

Members were in agreement that they needed more time to digest the proposals and the suggested twinning with a Dutch town noted for its 400m speed skating oval and associated activities. ECDC to be informed of proposal.

More information will be supplied to members before the next meeting.

# PUBLIC QUESTION TIME & COMMUNITY ISSUES

Residents of Saffron Close are taking part in a consultation for their views over the siting an aerial runway on the open space in the centre of the development.

#### DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORTS:

Councillor Wright reported on the need for further consultation regarding the shortfall of housing needs around the District and have now said all the housing will go to Soham and no housing allocation for Littleport.

The Planning Committee can comment on this matter at a future meeting pointing out we would have welcomed small pockets of development.

Councillor C M Ambrose felt the plan was too late to change.

#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT:**

Councillor Divine's email of 15<sup>th</sup> September had been circulated to all councillors via email.

#### PLAY

ECDC had submitted a summary of a play report for Littleport. It was agreed the Play Area and Open Spaces Committee look at the report in detail and report back to Council. Only toddler facilities in the parish is in surplus. Informal open space,

junior and youth facilities are in deficit.

## TRAFFIC SUB COMMITTEE:

Councillor F J Brown reported a scheme to reduce the speed on New River Bank and Branch Bank together with new white lines at the Sandhill junction has been submitted to County Council for consideration under the jointly funded improvement schemes

Members also raised concerns at the potholes on Branch Bank.

#### TRANSFER OF PADDOCKS AND PUBLIC CONSULTATION:

Members agreed the legal process go ahead to transfer the land known as the Paddocks at Highfield be transferred from the developers to the Parish Council.

The Paddocks are currently divided into four clearly defined areas and it was agreed a consultation process be carried out through the next edition of Littleport Life with Parishioners seeking their views on the proposals or any other options.

#### PROPOSED ICE STADIUM:

Councillor C M Ambrose Smith had drafted out a summary of concerns as a basis for discussion. Councillor Hayes asked that a "need" survey be carried out before embarking on such an ambitious project.

Councillor Wright reminded members this is not a new idea and of the unsuccessful bid by Littleport in the early 1990's to create an outdoor synthetic surface skating rink on the Moors with the aid of a million pound grant.

If it is proven there is a need there need to be realistic costs on construction, site purchase, ongoing costs and how they will be met.

In principle members with 1 abstention gave support in principle to the idea subject to a needs survey.

#### PRESS RELEASES POLICY:

Following lengthy discussions on the issue Councillors are free to write to the press making clear it is their view and not that of the whole council. Therefore members agreed there was no need to draw up a policy document.

#### CABLEWAY?

The Clerk reported the survey to provide a Cableway at Saffron Close resulted in a 40% feedback with 13 votes against and only 7 in favour.

#### **DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORTS:**

Councillor C M Ambrose Smith reported the Boundary Commission review of the number of Councillors will go ahead.

Councillor D I Ambrose Smith reported that ECDC were taking the lead in design on the North Ely Country Park and felt this should be a City Council project.

Work is still ongoing with the access over open spaces at Woodfen and Longfield Road.

Littleport Station Car Park extension – still looking at alternative land – ECDC are not communicating with land owners.

#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT:**

Councillor Divine emailed reports were circulated to Council

#### **EXTERNAL AUDITORS REPORT:**

The external audit for the year ended 31st March 2014 was received.

#### ANGLIAN WATER CHARITABLE GRANT:

The grant was dealt with in the Finance Meeting.

#### **DOG BIN:**

Members approved the purchase of a dog bin to be located at the Friars Way/Parsons

Lane junction.

FREĔ IT:

The East Cambs Community Learning and Skills Partnership has some funding to assist people in need of help with the advancing changes in IT. Suggest they contact YPL and Littleport Library who will be better acquainted with the needs.

FINANCIAL REGULATIONS 2014:

The Deputy Clerk circulated the proposed financial regulations to councillors before the meeting. The model regulations cover the use of internet banking, prepaid debit cards and credit cards if needed in the future. The need for more budgetary forward planning was highlighted to include a forecast for the next 3 years.

#### NEW PUBLIC OPEN SPACE

Public open space provision in Littleport will be increasing in the coming months. As part of the planning agreement for the Highfield development the land known as The Paddocks will be handed over to the Parish Council for use as public open space

in the next few months. Some of you may be aware that the area is made up of four paddocks each surrounded by a hedge. The Parish Council's Open Spaces committee have come up with some ideas for using The Paddocks and would like to know if you agree with the ideas.

Paddock 1. This paddock borders the footpath between Upton Place and the Highfield development. It is proposed that this paddock is laid to grass with picnic benches and some trees offering a grass area for informal play for families to enjoy.

Paddock 2. It is proposed that this paddock is used for a bicycle BMX park with dirt mounds similar to the park in Wilburton. This would be for bicycles only and not for motorbikes or mini motos.

Paddock 3. This paddock would be a wildlife meadow with paths mown through to allow visitors to walk round the meadow.

Paddock 4. It is suggested that this is a dog walking paddock to allow dogs a chance to run off the lead away from play areas and recreation grounds.

Please remember that The Paddocks have not yet been transferred to the Parish Council ownership and are still private property. We will let residents know when The Paddocks are open for public use.





The village is very proud of the Littleport Brass Band. They are a very progressive and professional group who currently compete at the highest level.

Under the Musical Direction of Nigel Bramley who is also a solo cornet player with the famous Virtuosi GUS Band, the Littleport Brass Band was crowned the 2008 London & Southern Counties 3<sup>rd</sup> Section Champions. They have continued to progress to the top of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Section's grading table, earning them a place in the 1<sup>st</sup> Section in 2013.

Littleport Brass Band has been entertaining the public since as far back as 1880, with a repertoire that now ranges from traditional brass band music to special arrangements of 'pop songs', film soundtracks and swing band arrangements.

The band itself has 29 members which includes Assistant Musical Director and 2<sup>nd</sup> baritone

player Susan Peacock, but only two members actually live in the village. Steven Garwood, who plays hornet and Giles Philbey, who was originally a cornet player, but who has now turned himself into an E flat bass player - because they were short of someone to play tuba.

As Giles commented jokingly, "Well looking at the size of me you'll know why I was picked for playing the tuba"

Sadly the band has lost two of their veteran members in the space of just over a year. Howard Peacock who passed away after battling illness in October 2013 and Roy Neal who died so tragically in an accident in November 2014. A memorial concert was held for Howard with the combined Littleport and Gus bands – according to his wishes.

Roy Neal's funeral was held at St George's with wonderful tributes paid.

He was a Littleport man through and through. He worked on the land like his father before him and had a great love for the outdoor life. Roy represented Littleport at cricket and football, and as a 16 year old he was in the Cadets' band before leading the Littleport Brass Band as Drum Major with his trusty Mace for 58 years. A tribute will be arranged from the Littleport Brass Band in the New Year.

would never know it had been anything other than


a classroom. To replace all the computers we have had wi-fi installed across the school and been given laptops and i-pads for use in the classrooms.




Romans for a day; Years 1 and 2 visited Ely Museum as part of a learning challenge on old buildings. We are so fortunate to live in such an historically rich area.

With the end of term Nativity play in mind, we look forward to Christmas and the New Year and next term too!





#### W.H. COX—STILL FEEDING LITTLEPORT

One of Littleport's most valued family businesses, W H Cox Butchers, may have to finally close its doors on Main Street.

A village wouldn't be the same without its very own butcher, and these are the



sentiments of another fellow trader, Matt Holmes, who told Littleport Life: "The thought of them closing would certainly spell disaster for Littleport as a whole."

In contrast Holmes Furnishers (formerly Neale's) is going from strength to strength and now he has opened another shop called 'The Other Shop' which has received rave notices from locals and newcomers alike.

It would be the end of an era if W H Cox Butchers was to be no more. The name is steeped in history and the business came about when Mr Cox, who had just come out of the army, began to buy frozen Argentine beef off a railway truck, which he sold at a very reasonable price.

Days of flooding and ration books were all part of post-war hardship Britain, but it was taken over by Mr Ron Cleveland before Mr Andrew Binks became a partner in 1977. Mr Cleveland's retirement enabled Andrew not only to run the butchers how Mr Cox had used to run it in the past, but to move the premises from Station Road to Main Street.

"I kept the name of W H Cox Butchers going because I thought why change a good

name, that has served the good people of Littleport so well. I still sell good sides of beef which come from farms in Lincolnshire, while the chickens I buy come from good breeders in Sutton. We make all the pies here. Pork pies will cost £1.20, Cornish Pasties are priced £1.00, and we sell our own sausages and gluten free bangers on request; plus we cut our own cheese and we even sell some



fresh veg."

None of Andrew's three grown up children are interested in taking over the butchers' business, and his health has taken a bit of a battering having had a replacement heart valve. The working week does takes its toll, having to set the alarm for 4.45 am and finishing up at 1 pm, even though he does have a part-time assistant in Steve.

And as Andrew admitted: "I don't have the energy to keep the shop open for more hours. My wife collects me from the shop and takes me to the club for a beer and then back home to Little Ouse where I enjoy feeding my chickens."

Mr Binks won't be packing up altogether because he has a very popular café down on the corner of White Hart Lane. It's opposite where the once popular George & Dragon stood - and which was kept by his Mother and Uncle Nat for a good 68 years.

A. J. Caterers at The Old Butcher's Shop Café opens from 6 am to 2 pm. Mrs Jenny Binks is seen behind the scene cooking up many a satisfying meal as customer after customer just continues to come back for more. And if you can't stop you can order a takeaway.

A.J.Caterers is for those who are in need of a quick buffet which will be cooked and delivered on the day of your event.

Villages wouldn't be a village with the odd saucy joke doing the rounds, and Andrew Binks was happy to tell me this one knowing that everyone he knew had all now died.

"William Henry Cox's calling card was a sausage on the joint and when the meat was delivered if the sausage was moved from the top of the joint, it meant that her husband was at home."

This year your Christmas Celebration Lights Committee has worked hard in conjunction with all those shops, businesses and private individuals to ensure that Littleport is well lit up over the holiday period!
