Now that the town centre is beginning to have a buzz about it again it has prompted the group to turn their attention to the condition of the street furniture and the town centres general appearance.


We are now beginning a tidy up campaign and hope that by the time you read this article, you will have already noticed a difference.

### FREE - Street Signs

To establish a Neighbourhood Watch scheme is very easy and normally there is just one cost involved; that of providing the street signs that usually are placed on convenient lampposts. Littleport Parish Council has kindly donated money so that residents within the Parish of Littleport can establish a scheme without this additional cost. # THE HISTORY OF PEACOCK'S MEADOW

Back in November, a second meeting was convened to discuss ways to go forward with the regeneration of the land at the back of Parsons Lane and Limes Close that belongs to the Sanctuary Housing Association. Sanctuary were looking at building more houses some years ago but decided against it, thus leaving this land as nature intended. A grant was made to enable some fruit trees to be planted but with access becoming difficult for human beings, the space developed itself into a haven for wild-life and plants. More recently some residents of Littleport brought the existence of this natural haven to the notice of their neighbours and instigated a move in the village to

facilitate its continuation as a green space where all can enjoy this pleasant environment. It was also mooted at the first meeting that the space could be named the 'Woodland Garden' A committee has now been set up to ensure that the gardens are going to be looked after, and promoted so that everyone in the village is aware of this newly accessible amenity, not just those with access to the internet! This new amenity first saw light of day through questions asked about this piece of land, and access to it, of their fellow Littleportians on the Littleport Notice Board Facebook page. There is now another page called Living in Littleport.

The chair Deborah Curtis-Watson



has now set up a Peacock's Meadow Facebook page so that the community can take part in offering ideas for the gardens. Some of the first planned activities will of course be a litter pick. The committee's aim is for the garden to be a well-used area for residents to appreciate the wildlife and flora, and Sanctuary have promised to put up signs at the entrance in Limes Close and also along Parsons Lane showing how to find the gardens. Sanctuary have also promised to put a gate up in the Limes Close entrance which it proposes to have locked at dusk. Susan Green

### Heart-warming Stories from Littleport...

# Here we bring you a tale of one family's life and times during the 20th Century... Elaine Lee tells us this is In Memory of Jack Lee, General Builder, Station Road, Littleport

It was February 28th 1912 when Nellie Lee gave birth to her sixth child, a boy they named Jack. The labour was long and the birth difficult, and Susie who was 13 was running in and out of the room obeying orders given by the village woman who came to assist in the birth. Susie was also looking after the younger children and trying to keep them out of Dolly Crabb's way who not only acted as the local midwife but was also called upon to lay out the dead ready for the local community to pay their respects. In fact Dolly had been called out the night before and lacking in sleep was extremely irritable.

The family's home was situated along the riverbank in Little Ouse. There was a kitchen scullery where there was an open range fire which doubled up as a cooker, a small front room and a bedroom, a ladder that led to the upstairs area where all the children slept. Sheds and outhouses had been built outside for other uses.

Beales worked on the local farm, he had a plot of land with the house and kept a goat, a pig and chickens. The goat provided the family with milk, the pig would be fattened and killed and the chickens provided eggs and a Sunday dinner. The family's vegetables were grown on this land too. Beales was the horse keeper earning ten

shillings a week, two shillings more than the average labourer as he had to work seven days a week and longer hours to look after the horses. Beales started work at 6 am and finished at 8pm during the summer months, the children had to feed the livestock and tend to the vegetable patches. Beales believed in hard work and all his children had to do their share.


While Nellie rested Susie set about all the chores her mother would have carried out on a daily basis. Although the weather had not been particularly cold that February, fierce gale force winds had caused the Fens to blow and everywhere was covered in black dust. The floors of their home were compressed mud with rag rugs, these had to be swept daily for the house was constructed of a brick base, clapperboard frame and a tin roof; this menace of the Fens found its way on to all surfaces.



for she had watched her mother from an early age. She was proficient at preparing any birds or fish they trapped and making them into pies.

The washing was done in one of the outhouses; the brick copper had a fire underneath which boiled the water, a scrubbing board and hard soap was used. There was a fair amount of washing that day, and after struggling with the mangle to relieve the clothes of as much water as possible. Susie hung the clothes on airers which dangled from the ceiling in the hope they would dry.

Beales had secured a large amount of turf and Bob who had just turned 11 was busy keeping the fires going. There was also some bog oak which was to be used sparingly.

The house had no running water. The only source was the river. Bob was not strong enough to work the pump so all afternoon he had been lowering buckets tied to a piece of rope into the dip hole. Bob was a slight child and tired easily. This chore was soon passed over to Bill who at 9, not only collected the water, but boiled it in pans on the fire.

Nellie was a strong woman and refused to 'lie in' as staying in one's bed of confinement for two weeks after childbirth was called, and three days after giving birth she left her bed.

#### December 23rd 1916

Jack's older brother Ernest was making paper chains out of scraps of paper stuck together with flour paste. Freda who was 10 had the job of decorating the room with the finished product. The gloves knitted by Freda, Susie and

Nellie in the evenings were wrapped in brown paper ready to be handed out after church on Christmas Day. The large cockerel had been killed and was hanging in the shed ready to be dressed for their dinner. The youngest child, Percy, who was just two years old, was bemused by all the unusual activity.

Bob who was 17 years old, and had been working on the farm since the age of 12 had biked to Ely with the sole purpose of buying oranges for the Christmas treat. His spirits were low that day despite the festive season. Bob would be called up soon like so many of the local lads he knew. And news of Stanley Barrett's death had come as a great shock to Bob for they had shared so many boyish pranks, resulting in a good hiding from their respective fathers.

More recently there had been the horror of Alfie Barker being sent home after only two days at The Battle of Festubert. Bob heard that he spent his days propped in a chair with a faraway look in his eyes then screamed in terror through the night.



The local community could not recall a worse winter, the land was frozen as was the river; it felt as if the area had come to an icy standstill. Bob was so cold he must have felt he was on the point of collapse as he entered the Rose and Crown on Forehill.

The warmth of the pub hit him as he made his way through the smoky atmosphere to the counter. It was a Saturday so Bob had just been paid and felt he deserved a small bottle of barley wine to warm him against his return journey of 8 or more miles.

Bob was more than merry by the time he left, he had enjoyed several

barley wines in the company of Horrie Rolfe, they wished each other the compliments of the season and Bob set off on his bike.

Bob was feeling extremely light headed as he glided down Forehill on waterside, and due to the incline of the road and the icy conditions he lost control.

Bob's body was brought to the surface an hour later. He had had gone straight under the thick ice and was unable to save himself.

#### **April 1937**

The large house by the railway station in Littleport was £605 and Jack had haggled for two months over the price - but old Bill Clarke would not be moved. Jack needed a large house for he had plans. He was running a successful painting and decorating business now employing several men

and he needed storage space. The house had two large front rooms, a kitchen and scullery plus another two rooms, one of which would be his office. Upstairs there were five bedrooms and a bathroom, it was ideal. Jack moved his parents in to end their days in comfort so that in the fullness of time the harsh living conditions of their past life would become a distant memory.

Jack was sweet on Jessie the butcher's daughter!

He would bide his time on that but one thing was for sure, that was the girl he was going to marry.

Jack married Jessie in 1944 the war having held up marriage plans. They went on to have four children. Beales died aged 85, Nellie died aged 92 in the comfort of their home which is still owned by a member of the Lee family.

In Littleport Cemetery is a stone which quite simply says:

'Our Dear Boy, Robert Lee, December 23rd Age 17, 1916.'

# THE STORY BEHIND 'COLEBYS' THE SHOP IN GRANBY STREET!

When July arrives, I always know that I will be volunteering myself for stewarding the Littleport 10k run which starts off and finishes at the Leisure Centre, writes Cathy Gibb. During one of my stewarding patches for the 2015 run, which happened to be the final stretch of the route on Camel Road. I encountered an enthusiastic spectator who asked if I had seen his brother Harry run past yet after describing him to me. He hadn't made it to Camel Road at that point, so telling me that his name was Jake we got chatting. I realised then that I was speaking to none other than one of the Coleby brothers from the famous shop in Granby Street, so I just had to find out more!

By the way, Jake's brother Harry at 69 is an experienced seasoned competitor and he finished the 10k race in a respectable time of 1 hour 2 minutes and 18 seconds.

When I met up with them both again they certainly had plenty of fascinating stories to tell and showed me some brilliant tale-telling old family photos including one of their dad Sid in army uniform, and Jake as a cute young boy.

I wondered why brothers Jake and Harry decided not to follow in their parents' footsteps and run the Coleby's family business? Jake thought a moment then said; "It was because we witnessed at first hand the sacrifices and the hardship that our parents had gone through and I can tell you they would literally have to count every penny." He continued; "Nowadays people say they are hard up, but they really don't know the meaning of the word, never mind what it's like to struggle. We were poor and we certainly didn't have it easy either."

"I remember when my father returning from the war in Belgium opened the front door and came in and I called out, 'Who are you?' and when he said he was my dad I said, "You are not my Dad". And because his dad wasn't around, it

was every Sunday night that "I used to bawl my eyes out because I knew my mum, who worked at the shirt factory would always take me to Grandmother Harley (and that is a story in itself) who brought me up for the rest of the week.

"In fact, I hadn't seen my dad for 7 years, and being an only a child at the time - I didn't know any better. My dad got demobbed and came home, and I vividly remember him saying that he had spent the last six years on the receiving end of everyone's tether always telling him what he should or shouldn't do. He certainly wasn't going to put up with it anymore, so he decided to take the plunge and start up his own business and that's how the Colebys shop came into being."

The Colebys shop was the front room of the premises, and my dad Sid, 'El Cyd' as he was called from that well known Charlton Heston film yet



my dad was more sensible than the character Heston played. Dad was trying to stop everyone killing one another by talking to them. You could say he was a bit ahead of his time," said Jake.

"Dad started off as a barber and I remember how his customers threw a wobbly when he put his prices up from a shilling to one and sixpence. (5p to 7.5p) Then Jake continued; "Dad rented the property from a man called Major Crane, but he only called himself Major because he was in the Home Guard. Dad was an apprentice when he went to war, and we are talking about a grown man - that is how it was in those days. He was born in 1911 so you are looking at a 28 year-old. When he returned home he went back to Mr Dobson who ran the hairdressing business where he originally worked and told him that he was now going to work on his own. Mr Dobson got so angry as it meant that Dad would be in direct competition with him, especially being situated just round the corner. Dobson was old school in that he believed in the master/ servant relationship as they used to have in those days."

The original name of the shop used to be A.S.G.Coleby and Son Hairdresser and Tobacconist with licence to sell tobacco, but he didn't even have a board up to say what the shop was selling.

"I will tell you how hard it was! When Dad first set up in business he started by selling a few razor blades and he just couldn't afford to buy the stock. Our parents didn't have any money

at all, but the branded razor blades in those days was Wilkinson Sword. Well my mother (Margaret) got on her bike and rode to Ely Market and she bought some Wilkinson Sword razor blades which she brought back and father sold at a ha'penny profit. That's how it was in those days," Jake emphasised.

"He had a 7 year-old young son and a year old baby boy and just come out of the armed forces. We were living at 24 Wisbech Road at the time until 1954. The building which is now called the Colebys went up for auction as the previous owner Major Crane had died, and I recall my dad telling us a story that he had gone to the bank to try and raise the money and he was given a certain amount which enabled him to bid for the premises. Now on first visiting the building it was like being on the set of the period drama, The Forsyte Saga. It had 16 rooms, two staircases, a servants quarter, plus huge wooden doors with brass door knobs and there were even the old red quarry tiles which was quite the thing in those days.

In 1948 dad bought 24 Wisbech Road for £250 and sold it for £800 in 1954. The massive 16 roomed house we mentioned he paid £2,000 for and remember in those days people

were earning roughly £7 a week. It left Dad short and my mother nearly had a nervous breakdown she was so worried about whether they would ever be able to pay that money back. Don't forget in this neck of the woods our saying is 'we cut our cloth accordingly', where we only buy what we need and not what we want," stated Harry who told me that the Colebys shop was very popular, not only selling fishing tackle when it was in season, but toys during the winter time. People weren't well off in those days, so their mum set up a Christmas Club Book where customers would pay weekly amounts towards buying presents for their children at Christmas time. Harry also told how the family used to sit in the scullery and his father would place himself in the living room which looked into the shop and where the customers who lived off the land would come into the shop. They were so trustworthy that instead of coming out to serve them their dad allowed them to serve themselves and then put the money in the till, and they could even help themselves to change. That was how it was in those days.

In 1987 Sid and Margaret Coleby eventually retired, and the family business was finally sold to a prison officer from Norwich whose name escapes Jake, but who asked to trade under the Colebys name.

Harry is a welder by trade and Jake is a mechanic, and neither of them have had any desire to move from their beloved Littleport. After all Jake, built his own bungalow in 1964,



and with the help of his brother Harry dug all the footings out by hand with a spade, while Harry, gutted and refurbished his own home.

If you ever meet up with the brothers, you will find that they are the most knowledgeable people going when it comes to their beloved Fens. You can spend hours learning all about how the Fen accent cannot be copied because it has so many different accents in it. Then there is the often heard 'Fen Tigers' name for fenland people. This could have stemmed from when they were draining the Fens using what were usually termed drains and ditches that the Fen people called dykes hence the workers were called Fen Dykers, who were so fierce in their opposition to the land drainage scheme, sabotaging all efforts, that the name got changed to Fen Tigers. The Mildenhall Fen Tigers

founded in 1975 is a successful speedway club but back in the day, the Coleby brothers were also part of a successful cycle cross scrambling team called the Fen Tigers and were unbeatable in their heyday. Both their parents were also keen cyclists with mum Margaret becoming the Fen Tigers club's chair. At the time

the Colebys couldn't afford a car and rode a tandem to get around. Jake even remembers being put into

a side car so they could take him wherever they went.

It was perhaps no coincidence that their Mother was into bikes because she happened to be one of the Harleys of Harley Davidson fame, Margaret Jane Harley in fact. Jake Coleby also explained that if his English teacher had any belief in his abilities and had encouraged him having passed six GCE O levels in English Language, English Literature, French, Latin, History and Maths, that he could have become a very good journalist, but was rather over qualified for the manual labouring jobs going in Littleport.

His history teacher Leon Kitchen who originated from the North of England announced that the pupils were going do an article on the Littleport and Ely riots and asked if anyone knew anything about them.

And Jake piped up; "Yes Sir. I had an ancestor hung in that".

Teacher Kitchen said: "Did you really." "Yes Sir I did", replied Jake who to

"Yes Sir I did", replied Jake who to this day has never forgotten his teacher's reply as he walked down the aisle of desks and put his hands on Jake's shoulders and said" Oh I just touched a part of history". Harry played football for Littleport Reserves as a defender, but suffered

a leg injury off the field, falling off a ladder during work, that forced him to give up the game. He showed me pictures of his parents and one that particularly stood out was his father at the end of 1945 taken in Brussels when the war finished. His father was sent to Belgium to help clean up because of the devastation caused by the Nazis and there is a picture of a coffin of a Belgian resistance leader. "I have only gone by what our father has told us that on May the 8th World War II stopped in an instant, but they were still fanatical Nazis and still fighting onwards. Apparently when the war finished this Belgian resistance fighter thought it was safe to surface because the war was done and the Nazis murdered him. And so they gave this man a proper military send off."

Their father Sid Coleby was able to celebrate a special surprise 80<sup>th</sup> birthday party, but passed in 1994 on New Year's Eve at the age of 84, while their mother Margaret lived for another six years and passed at the age of 86.

The Coleby brothers have so many tales to tell that it would have taken up all the pages of this magazine, but they are just one of the many whose families make up the history of this village and where so many more people now are coming to live and experience the pleasures of Littleport Life!





I am not just 'Mummy' as Sarah still insists on calling me, I am her primary carer as my lovely girl has a learning disability and is dependent on my assistance.


Being a carer is at times challenging especially when there is no-one else to help at home.

As Jesus was recorded as saving by his follower John, God is a Spirit and those who worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth. This statement is at the heart of our Spiritualist philosophy. And as Paul stated some years later after Jesus had been killed by the Roman occupiers of his country, Israel, we are all spirit beings here in the physical body. This enabled the mid-winter licentiousness to continue under the auspices of the Established, orthodox, Church of Rome. The date? December 25<sup>th</sup>.

In the Bible the seasons are only ever referred to as summer and winter. Winter's darkness, damp and cold, has ever cried out for some contrived warmth and light – of the spiritual kind as well as physical. And hope for the return of sunnier, longer days. What better than to celebrate the birth of the one who was born

to bring spiritual light and warmth to the world with everlasting life; and why not around the time of the shortest day and longest night. An auspicious time of year indeed! December 25th continues to be

popularly singled out for merry-making, but whatever date Jesus was delivered, we shouldn't forget the significance of the angels who appeared in a blaze of light to those shepherds watching their flocks at night, more likely at harvest-time, who told them that they brought news of great joy; the birth of a bringer of peace and love and everlasting life for all who walk the earth.

Here in Littleport in the heart of the English countryside, we ask the Great and Holy Spirit to grant comfort and joy for all, with health and a measure of happiness throughout the winter months and for God to help us make it a 'Happy Christmas' every day. Amen.



Money to cover the production costs was hard to come by, but everyone chipped in and rallied round.


Haddenham Drama Group lent the backdrop and an Aladdin's lamp;

Albert Ware of the then Littleport Paint Shop loaned trellising which was covered with black bin bags and all the flowers for the scenery were supplied by Grenville Goodson, then proprietor of the greengrocery and florists.

Percy Coulson, Chair of the Village Hall Committee and Caretaker Reg Jones also lent a hand by putting cardboard up at the windows so as to keep the light out.

Rehearsals were held both at the Methodist Church and St George's Parish Room, and extra entertainers were brought in which included The Samara Ballet Dancers and Paul Allingham's musical colleagues. These talented men were keyboard player Frances and drummer Nigel Smith who provided their own arranged musical accompaniment for the panto.

The show, which was performed in March 1995, was a great success and a testament to the great efforts of all those involved including Paul Allingham who sadly passed suddenly in December 1995 in the midst of rehearsals for the next panto, Cinderella. As they say in the entertainment industry when tragedy strikes, "The show must go on," and it did when Eric Stannard stood in for Paul, helping the Players to pull off their second spectacular pantomime. Paul's wife Dorothy Allingham was also very active and supportive, juggling many jobs from working as Front of House, Treasurer, and running numerous raffle events with many women from the WI which helped raise needed funds for The Littleport Players. The tradition of pantomimes and musicals still continue

at the age of just 11, and now at 24, seeing her on stage, you wouldn't believe that she was once a very shy young teenager.

"I encouraged Chelsea to get involved in acting because I knew it would help her grow as a person, and now you just can't get her off the stage," said a delighted mum Karen, who admitted too that it was her daughter Chelsea who had encouraged her in turn to step out of her comfort zone and become the Littleport Players' Director instead of sticking to her usual hair and make-up artist role.

"At first directing was really nerve wracking. For the first two shows I shadowed Becky Green who is currently directing Cats and Peter Pan for the Campaign Amateur Theatre

(CAT) Company, Ely. She has been in so many shows and has a lot of experience, and is even qualified enough to be a drama teacher, but holding down a full time job she chooses not to.

"I have to admit that every time I direct a production I always say 'never again', yet on the first night when I stand at the back and watch it all unfold I think how really good it is which just gives you such a buzz. There is nothing really like it," said Karen, who mentioned that the company don't write their own script which means having to pay about £300.00 for the copyright every time they put a pantomime on.

The Littleport Players has seen many actors come and go. The excellent Jack Byng has started a new life living and working in the Midlands. Daniel Goulding has now gone to university to study acting, but Megan Bidecant who has played many a leading lady role alongside the 2014 Best Youth

Actor George Harrison has returned from London university to study in Cambridge and returns to the cast. It is thanks to Megan that 9 year old Millfield School pupil Kira Simmonds (who she used to babysit as a 4 year old) joined up, and along with her school mates Hannah Townsend and Lexi Dews play very convincing sailors in this season's Pirates of the Panto. Sadly one the longest running local drama groups which spanned 60 years spell which comprised of 180 productions and donating thousands of pounds to Charity, Lakenheath Amateur Dramatic Society (LADS) had to fold due to lack of members which has seen a few join Littleport Players. This a major problem that seems to plague most drama groups and Littleport Players is not any different. "We tend to struggle to find male actors - which is the story of my life," ioked Karen who continued: "We do attract the younger boys, but we tend to have great difficulty holding on to them from the ages of 16 to about 25/26, and it is because of that that we are extremely limited to what shows we can actually put on."

It would be a sad day for Littleport if we were to see the end of the Players. They are constantly on the lookout for actors and according to Director Karen Booth, "You don't have to be good - just enthusiastic" and who added that some financial assistance wouldn't go amiss either if they are to keep the community entertained for years to come.

### THE RESCUE PONY: GINGERBREAD'S STORY



Unlike Anna Sewell, who wrote Black Beauty, I do not know the early days of Gingerbread. She came into my life one hot, dusty August, after a friend had told me how, while he waited for the London train, he gave his lunch to a thin little chestnut pony living by the railway station, that always seemed hungry.

I decided to investigate and found a small, bony but very pretty 10 hand chestnut mare in a bald paddock with only a bucket of water for company. After tracing the old chap who owned her, I discovered she was only 2 years old and "vicious" and was to be sold to our local dealer at the weekend. I felt that with training, good food and correct care, she would make a good driving pony and on the spot offered him £50.00. To my surprise he accepted and I negotiated the rent for his bald paddock until I could move her. Both her life and mine changed overnight. I contacted an old friend called Stan who, in his younger days, was a horse keeper for a local

farmer, and asked him to help me break her in for driving. Together we spent about three weeks feeding, grooming and giving her some tender loving care. I called her Gingerbread as her deep chestnut coat shone like copper as her health improved daily. She accepted his training easily using an old sack filled with straw as a saddle and soon learned to take the bit and respond to the long reins. I went to Wisbech Market with Stan and purchased a small flat cart, together with harness and within a couple of weeks she was merrily 'trotting out' with Stan and I around the village. She soon learnt the way to my house where she was allowed to graze on the lawn and also where Stan lived, as his wife Nell was always ready with some apples and carrots.

Gingerbread was very good on the roads as the noise from the railway station had made her used to loud sounds, bangs and squeaky brakes. Changes had to come to Gingerbread when I was ill. As I was a helper for the Elysian Riding for the Disabled at Paradise Farm, Ely, run by Ms Enid

Bedford, I asked her if she would take Gingerbread to Paradise while I was recovering as she needed exercise and care. The cart and harness went with her so the training could EVERYONE IS VERY FOND OF HER AND BRING APPLES AND CARROTS AS A REWARD FOR HER HARD WORK

continue. Her new friends in the field were very curious as she was so small, but a big chestnut mare called Shamrock became her best buddy and they spent many hours together watching the riding lessons and general yard routine. At first Gingerbread was quite nervous of so many children and events, but

gradually relaxed and became a favourite to be used for grooming practice by the smallest pupils as they could reach her back very easily. She soon learned to stand still whilst loading was in process and knew exactly where we were going to each ride. The passengers were able to take a second set of canvas reins fitted to her halter and steer her round the course. I was always in control using the leather reins but Gingerbread knew what to do without any instructions! Sometimes we do about 10 to 12 rides during a morning's work and she never makes any fuss while waiting patiently for events to happen. Everyone is very fond of her and bring apples and carrots as a reward for her hard work. She soon knows when the sessions are nearly over and is

After a roll in the fresh grass she wanders off to join her friends and they pass the afternoon munching away together. Gingerbread is an invaluable part of our team at Elysian Driving for the Disabled and gives so much pleasure to all the drivers who take part each week.

We have just learnt that Gingerbread will be qualifying for a long service award which is so well deserved. We are the only group that offers the driving as a therapy as all our drivers are so disabled.

I never dreamt that I would be so proud of an animal that cost so little and who has given so much to all. *Iris Copsey*

### IRIS COPSEY'S FESTIVE FARE!

Bakewell Tart (with a Christmas twist)

### Ingredients:

4 oz ready-made Short Crust Pastry (Sweet)

### Filling:

1 oz Margarine

2 oz Castor Sugar

2 oz Ground Rice

1 oz Ground Almonds

1 Egg

2 tbps Apricot Jam

3 tbps Mincemeat

A few Almond nut slices

#### Method:

Line a 7" sandwich tin with greased foil

Line tin with rolled out pastry, trim round rim

Spread with jam then mincemeat on top

Cream margarine and sugar



Mix together ground almonds and rice Add to creamed mix with beaten egg Spread mix into case evenly Decorate with sliced almonds and pastry star shapes that are made from the trimmings.

Bake: Moderate oven 375F Gas 4-5 for 40-45 minutes

Serve with cream or plain yoghurt.

## PUMPKIN SOUP RECIPE

### Ingredients:

1 medium size pumpkin, hollowed out to use the flesh

4 onions, peeled and chopped finely

6 large carrots peeled and finely grated (food processor does it properly)

3 medium potatoes peeled and cubed

4 oz butter to be melted in a large saucepan

One and a half pints of chicken stock or water and stock cubes

Large shake of mixed herbs

4 spring onions peeled and finely chopped

½ teaspoon of chilli or according to taste

1 pint full cream milk

Shake of salt and pepper, according to taste

#### Method:

Put butter into a saucepan and then prepare all the vegetables and stock Melt butter and then add onions, stir and coat and then add pumpkin Stir and cook till soft and squashy. Add carrot and stock and stir to mix Add herbs followed by salt and pepper. Bring to the boil and then turn down to

simmer gently for half an hour.

Add potatoes and spring onions and continue to cook gently for half an hour Add chilli a little at a time, testing taste each time (makes it spicy). Leave to cool and then press and then puree ¾ of the soup. Then using a potato masher, squash remainder before returning puree back into the saucepan.

To Serve: Heat gently adding milk according to the thickness required and serve with bread or rolls to dip.

There is a comic book series called 'God Hates Astronauts' and it's now the name of a Littleport group of talented musicians, keyboard and lead vocalist singer Christopher France and drummer Jordan Powell aged 17 and 18 respectively.

Christopher and Jordan explained that the name of their group doesn't portray their opinions or their genre of music and they don't wish to be pigeonholed either. Jordan says he prefers not to have their own music-making labelled, but that they can produce some 'mean cover versions' which apparently go down well at their live college gigs.

"I can't stand today's chart music. It really has no meaning. We make music for us, and if it pleases other people, then that's fine by us."

The band was initiated while they have been attending Cambridge Regional College. They told

Littleport Life that they have excellent and supportive music tutors including Ben Pringle of the Time Team signature tune fame who had expertly and skilfully mixed and matched these young musicians together. Three bands were formed, one of which was 'God Hates Astronauts' that also comprises bassist, 17 year old Nathan Jackson and 20 year old guitarist, Alex Penny. They were originally fronted by a female singer who shared vocals with Christopher, but when she left to work outside of their particular musical circle he just stepped up as lead vocal which now suits their style and sound of music. These innovative music makers are wary of the music industry. They have their feet firmly on the ground and are very grateful that they have had the backing of their families.

"The important thing is that we have always focused on

our musical education. We want to learn the best we can before performing in front of an audience," emphasised Christopher, who first started playing the piano at the age of 4. Although he lost interest and concentration for a while, when he was fourteen his interest was reignited and "It's been the best thing that I've ever done," said Christopher.

They told us that their current Level 3 course is made up of three diplomas, where they study Grade 5 theory that sees them spending most of their course work analysing classical pieces; what instruments to use; how the textures form, as well as transposing music and making their own arrangements and compositions etc.

It is no surprise that Jordan was destined for musicdom. His father Matthew was a pretty good drummer himself who fed his young sons Callum and Jordan on a healthy musical diet of The Who and AC/ DC considering the late great Keith Moon to have been a legend in his life time.

Callum despite being a good drummer decided to become a chef, so with the appropriate catering qualifications under his belt he moved into the catering business where is now a chef at the Newmarket Race Course restaurant.

"I was raised on music like Genesis. Pink Flovd, and that is where my interest of the keyboard came from. Then in my early teenage years I became a bit rebellious, but now being less hormonal. I started to listen to stuff like Metal. As a child one of my influences was keyboard player Keith Emerson, of Emerson Lake and Palmer, but I can always happily sit down and listen to a Sex Pistols album." revealed Christopher, who's now developing his voice to work with rock music.



Asked what makes 'God Hates Astronauts' different and unique from any other groups today. They replied, "We don't like to be musically limiting, but we are really still discovering ourselves. For instance, we have five songs and those songs are each very different in their own way." They will be working on putting out an EP soon which may or may not include the first song they wrote 'Jump Suit'.

"You know I purely write songs so I can get 'Distinctions' on my course," joked Jordan.
Jordan's bedroom at home has been transformed into a small

studio where they record demos and jam together. Their stage dress is the shirt and tie look. "We like to be presentable, but usually it ends up being a very sweaty kind of gig... We have done a few gigs including the Manea Gala. There were five other bands who played music like either Country or Ska, but we were the youngest group there, and although we felt a bit intimidated, the audience really appreciated our music," said Jordan.

"It is surprising how popular we are with the all - round universal music," said Christopher which prompted Jordan to interject, "I don't want to fit in to what the music industry is producing." Christopher then continued, "We have our own originality, and when we do cover versions of songs. We try and make the music more interesting and

challenging, but the audience are still able to recognise the song and they really like it".

"Our college audiences are very clever because they do recognise that the group have altered a certain popular song, but they do enjoy our arrangement or rearrangement of the song", commented Jordan who is thinking of pursuing a career in music as therapy.

On a more sombre note, both musicians spoke for their group members and every other budding musician when they said how lucky they were to have got into the music courses when they did because there is every likelihood that these courses will be phased out.

They said, "In fact there is a dearth of cultural activity generally, and we are really worried that music courses will be dving out. We did look into this in one of our Musical Outreach lessons where we looked at everything else, and not the music itself. We watched a documentary about how much money is being pumped into primary schools for them to have access to instruments. It was £250 for the whole school for a year. What does that buy? An expensive guitar case."

They are hoping to travel to New York in the New Year.



This was achieved through the dedication and commitment of every firefighter on our station who when required went the extra mile to work together, not forgetting their families who also make a commitment by being supportive and understanding.

We will be holding our Christmas Bingo again this year on Tuesday 22 December in the village hall. All of the proceeds go the Firefighters Charity and all of the prizes have been very kindly donated, for which we are ever grateful and thankful. Please come along and enjoy the fun.

### Just a few Recent incidents:

Crews attended an incident involving a Tractor and trailer which had overturned. The driver had sustained a number of injuries from this large heavy vehicle and required freeing from his cab. Crews used specialist lifting and cutting equipment during this challenging incident to release the driver. Following the completion of this incident the crew had no time to rest as they were immediately mobilised to another road collision involving a car which had collided with a tree. The crew again used the cutting equipment to free the injured driver.

A call for help reporting a person in difficulty in the river saw our crew use our water rescue equipment. The person had fallen into the water and was unable to get to the side or get out due to reeds and other debris. The crew managed to bring the person to safety. Apart from being cold the person had no other injuries.

A frantic rescue attempt played out in Norfolk following a call to a car which had crashed into a river trapping the driver. The crew worked in extremely difficult and demanding conditions in the cold muddy water to free the person from the upturned vehicle. Resuscitation was carried out before the arrival of Air ambulance to give them the best chance of survival but unfortunately they died later in hospital.

A chip pan set fire to the kitchen of a house in Ely when the occupier became distracted for just a few moments. They sustained minor injuries whilst trying to tackle the blaze. Crews from Littleport and Ely wore breathing apparatus and used hosereels to extinguish the flames. The kitchen was extensively damaged.

NEVER leave any cooking unattended even for a short while. Should it catch fire remove the heat, get out of the property and call the fire service.

Go and test your SMOKE ALARM now, it may just save your life!!

To deliver on these priorities, the authority will be working on a number of areas which include:

 Freezing the East Cambridgeshire element of Council Tax for 2016/2017.





- \* Support more Community Land Trusts throughout the district.
- \* Aim for a 60 per cent recycling rate and ensure bins are put back tidily.
- \* Oversee delivery of the multiplex cinema.
- \* Deliver the leisure centre in Ely and review and support leisure services throughout the District.
- Push to ensure the Ely Bypass is built.
- Keep free car parking in our city and town centre car parks.
- Seek to increase car parking spaces at Littleport Station and Angel Drove, Ely.
- Use the business rates retention fund on business development to create new jobs and opportunities for young people.

**East Cambs Aiming for Gold Standard** 

With East Cambridgeshire setting a high standard in tackling

homelessness, the District Council has been asked to host the National Practitioner for Department of Communities and Local Government's (DCLG) Housing Gold Standard.

Steve Tong, the Practitioner for the East of England and Kent, will be based in the Housing Options team for three days a week where he will help authorities work towards the Gold Standard.

He will also be assisting East Cambridgeshire with their goal of reaching Gold Standard status by September 2016 – a standard which is currently held by only two authorities in the UK.

The Gold Standard – funded by the DCLG - sets the bar for local homelessness services, protecting the country's most vulnerable when they face losing their home.

#### **Littleport Barclays Bank Closure**

Despite all our efforts to encourage Barclays to rethink their decision to shut down our branch, the doors closed on 9<sup>th</sup> October for the last time. We would just like to thank all the Barclays customers who wrote to appeal against the decision, and also to the organisers and supporters of the protest in the Main Street on Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> August.

We still believe that it is extremely important for our community to have a banking facility within the Village and are in the process of approaching other financial institutions regarding the viability of setting up a branch in Littleport.

#### Official Opening of G's Growers Mushroom Farm

On 21st October we all attended

the official opening of the recently completed May Farm Mushroom Facility which is situated approximately 3 miles out of Littleport along the Mildenhall Road.

This impressive state-of-the art facility, was built by G's Growers in supply partnership with Tesco, to increase the availability of UK grown fresh mushrooms.

Construction of the farm started in 2012, with the building of 12 growing tunnels and associated facilities. The first mushrooms were picked in November of that year, and a further 12 tunnels were added in 2013.


The most recent phase has just been completed, and the farm now comprises 48 tunnels, along with cold storage and packing facilities

May Farm grows white button, closed cup and large flat mushrooms, which are hand-picked, 365 days per year. Mushrooms actually double in size every 24 hours, and even keep on growing once they are picked.

May Farm produces 165 tonnes of mushrooms each week for sale through Tesco stores across the UK, and has reduced food miles through bringing production to the UK for products that were previously sourced from Europe






